

Community

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer... All the believers were together and had everything in common." - Acts 2:42-47

Big Idea: Christian community is more than just hanging out—it's living life together with purpose, love, and spiritual growth.

Community is Devoted to God's Word and Prayer

Truth:

Real community is built on spiritual connection, not just shared interests.

Key Verse:

Acts 2:42 - "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer."

Application:

Ask yourself—Is my friend group helping me grow closer to Jesus?

Community Shares Life, Not Just Space

Truth:

Christian community means we care deeply for each other's needs emotionally, spiritually, and practically.

Key Verse:

Acts 2:44-45 - "All the believers were together and had everything in common... They gave to anyone who had need."

Application:

What would it look like if you loved your small group like family?

Community is Attractive to the World

Truth:

When believers live in authentic community, others take notice.

Key Verse:

Acts 2:47 - "...praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily..."

Application:

People around you are looking for real connection. Be the kind of friend who makes Jesus known.

Icebreaker:

What's one thing you love about your group of friends? What's something weird or fun your friend group always does?

Go Deeper:

- 1. Read Acts 2:42-47 aloud together.
 - What does this passage show us about how the early Christians lived?
 - How is their idea of "community" different from what we see in most schools today?
- 2. Do you feel like you're part of a real Christian community? Why or why not?

Weekly Challenge: Live out Acts 2:42–47.

Pick ONE way to grow in community this week:

- Invite someone new to youth group
- Pray with a friend during the week
- Share something encouraging or helpful with someone
- Sit with someone who usually sits alone



Identity

"For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb... I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made... all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be." - Psalm 139:13-16

Big Idea: Your identity doesn't come from what others say about you—it comes from who God says you are.

You Were Created Intentionally

Truth:

You are not an accident—God made you on purpose, with purpose.

Key Verse:

Psalm 139:13 - "You created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb."

Application:

Don't let culture define you when your Creator already has.

You Are Wonderfully Made

Truth:

You are valuable and worthy—not because of how you look, perform, or compare, but because of how God made you.

Key Verse:

Psalm 139:14 - "I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made."

Application:

When you look in the mirror, do you see what God sees?

Your Life Has Purpose

Truth:

God has a plan for your life—even when you can't see it yet.

Key Verse:

Psalm 139:16 - "All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be."

Application:

Your identity is not just about who you are—it's about what you were made to do in Christ.

Icebreaker:

What's a nickname you've had, and how did you get it? What's one thing people often assume about you that isn't true?

Go Deeper:

- 1. Read Psalm 139:13-16 aloud together.
 - Which verse stands out to you most? Why?
 - How does knowing you're "fearfully and wonderfully made" challenge how you view yourself?
- 2. What are some lies you've believed about your identity?

Weekly Challenge: Truth Over Lies.

- Write down one negative thing you've believed about yourself. Then write what God says about you in Psalm 139 next to it.
- Share this truth with someone else who needs encouragement this week.



Gratitude

"Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." - 1 Thess 5:16-18

Big Idea: Gratitude is not just a feeling—it's a daily choice to recognize God's goodness no matter what you're facing.

Gratitude Starts with Rejoicing

Truth:

Gratitude isn't about ignoring your struggles; it's about focusing on the joy found in Jesus.

Key Verse:

1 Thess 5:16 - "Rejoice always"

Application:

What would it look like to "rejoice always" in your current season?

Gratitude Grows Through Prayer

Truth:

Prayer helps shift your heart from complaint to contentment.

Key Verse:

1 Thess 5:17 - "Pray continually"

Application:

If we talked to God as often as we texted, how might our perspective shift?

Gratitude is a Way of Life

Truth:

We don't give thanks for everything, but we can give thanks in everything.

Key Verse:

1 Thess 5:18 - "Give thanks in all circumstances"

Application:

Gratitude isn't about ignoring pain—it's about trusting God through it.

Icebreaker:

If you had to eat one food every day for a year, what would it be—and would you still be thankful?

Go Deeper:

- 1. Read 1 Thessalonians 5:16–18 aloud together.
 - Why do you think Paul connects joy, prayer, and thankfulness?
 - How is it possible to give thanks in all circumstances? What does that look like in real life?
- 2. What's one thing you've taken for granted that you want to thank God for today?

Weekly Challenge:

Each day, write down (or say out loud) 3 specific things

you're thankful for—big or small.

Try to include something about God, something about

someone else, and something about your day.



Christmas

Luke 2:8-14 - The angels announce Jesus' birth to the shepherds. John 1:14 - "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." Isaiah 9:6 - "For to us a child is born... and he will be called... Prince of Peace."

Big Idea: Christmas isn't just about gifts and good vibes—it's about God coming close to bring hope, healing, and eternal life.

God Came to Us

Truth:

Jesus didn't wait for us to be perfect—He entered our broken world.

Key Verse:

John 1:14 – "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us."

Application:

You don't have to "clean up" to come to Jesus—He meets you where you are.

Peace Is Possible

Truth:

The angels declared peace because Jesus came to restore what was broken.

Key Verse:

Luke 2:8-14 - The angels announce Jesus' birth to the shepherds.

Application:

Jesus brings peace with God, with others, and within yourself—will you receive it?

The Best Gift Is Jesus

Truth:

Presents fade, but Christ's love and hope last forever.

Key Verse:

Isaiah 9:6 – "For to us a child is born... and he will be called... Prince of Peace."

Application:

Are you focusing more on the wrapping paper or the real gift of the season?

Icebreaker:

If you could only keep one Christmas item (tree, music, presents, food), all year round, what would it be?

Go Deeper:

- 1. Read the scriptures aloud together.
 - Read Luke 2:8–14. Why do you think the angels appeared to shepherds first?
 - Read John 1:14. What does it mean that "the Word became flesh"? Why does it matter?
 - Read Isaiah 9:6. What stands out to you about the titles given to Jesus?
- 2. Is there an area in your life where you need the peace that Jesus offers?

Weekly Challenge: Find one way to show the love of Jesus this week:

- → Encourage someone lonely
- → Forgive someone
- → Give to someone in need
- → Invite someone to church
